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The line

The Todmorden Curve is the first direct train service for over 40 years which now runs between East Lancashire and Manchester, from Blackburn, through Todmorden and into Manchester Victoria.

The reinstatement of 500 metres of track known as the Todmorden West Curve has improved journey times between Burnley, Accrington and Manchester. This has put Burnley and Accrington within commuting distance of Manchester and opened up job prospects, as well as tourist and leisure opportunities.

Autistic people are welcome on the journey every day, just like everyone else, however the train line has organised autistic friendly days, in addition to trying to make train line as accessible as possible all year round.



General information and ticketing

To book travel assistance, call **0800 138 5560** or visit www.northernrailway.co.uk

Travel assistance can help you by making sure staff know you might need help getting on or off the train, or might have extra questions. Travel assistants work for the train company and usually also work on the trains or the stations. You only need travel assistance if you think you or your group will need extra assistance.

For ticketing purchases and information, visit www.northernrailway.co.uk

Tickets can be purchased online, in staffed stations or from ticket
machines. If there are no purchasing options in stations, tickets can be
purchased on the train, but a 'promise to pay' must be acquired from
the ticket machine (unless this is not operational). We strongly advise
purchasing tickets ahead of time. A promise to pay means you can pay
for your journey when you arrive at your destination. You can get them
from ticket machines. Unless the ticket machine is broken, or there is no
ticket machine or ticket office, you will need a promise to pay before
you board or you may be fined.



Family tickets and disabled railcard discounts are available.

Services may be quieter off-peak between 09.30 and 15.30, but be prepared - it might get busy! Someone might sit next to you or your group, or you might need to stand. If you need to sit down, you can ask someone nicely if you can sit in their seat, if there are no seats free for you. Someone might also sit down next to you on the train. You can show the person your Autism Alert card or BlueAssist card.

Some trains have seats for people with disabilities.



If someone challenges you or your group, you could say; "I need this chair please, I have a hidden disability called autism' and show your BlueAssist or Autism Alert card. If you need help, you can always ask the train conductor.

Parking is available (limited, charges may apply) at the following stations; Blackburn, Accrington, Rose Grove, Burnley Manchester Road, Todmorden, Littleborough and Manchester Victoria.

What to expect

Sunglasses and ear defenders are available (subject to on-the-day availability) at staffed stations along the line. Please request these from ticket office staff and return them at the end of your journey. The route features many bridges and tunnels, as well as other passing trains and passengers, all of which can be noisy.

What to bring with you

What to bring with you

The only thing you will be asked to show in order to travel is your ticket for you or your group. You should buy your ticket before boarding the train on the internet at www.northernrailway.co.uk or at a ticket machine at the train station.

Don't worry if you are unable to book on the internet or if the ticket machine is broken or closed on the day, you can buy a ticket on the train with cash or a card. Whatever else you would like to bring is up to you.

Music players and game devices can be great for covering loud noises on the train, but make sure it is not very loud so that you can still hear safety announcements. Make sure you always use headphones.

Books and mobile phones can also be excellent for long journeys.

If you need medication - such a an inhaler, make sure you bring this.

If its a hot day or raining you may need refreshments or umbrellas for your group.



What to do if the plan changes

If things change, like a train delay or a cancellation, the first thing to remember is to stay calm. The rail company will make sure you get to your final destination, and they are there to help you.

If your train is delayed or cancelled, check a timetable or use your phone to check when your next train is.

If you aren't sure, you can speak to a member of staff at the station.

If there are no staff at your station, you can press the 'help' button on the platform, if there is one.

Otherwise, you can call the Northern customer helpline at 0800 200 6060.

Trains often slow or stop on tracks; this does not mean there is an issue. Staff members will alert you to any delays or concerns as they happen.

If you lose something on a train, contact the Northern customer helpline above. If you see something that doesn't look right, feel unsafe or witness antisocial behaviour, contact the British Transport Police at 0800 40 50 40, or text 61016. In an emergency, always call 999.



Blackburn











Blackburn is a town in Lancashire, England, north of the West Pennine Moors on the southern edge of the Ribble Valley. Blackburn had a population of 117.963 in 2011. A former mill town, Blackburn was a boomtown of the Industrial Revolution and amongst the first industrialised towns in the world. Blackburn is a vibrant, happening place to be with great food, good sport and a fashionable heritage as well as a town centre that is creative, entrepreneurial and entertaining.

Accrington









The vibrant town of Accrington lies in Hyndburn in the heart of Pennine Lancashire. It is East Lancashire's best shopping district with fabulous independent boutiques, 21st century Arndale Shopping Centre and 19th century Victoria Market Hall, a grand Victorian building where market traders sell fresh Lancashire produce. Bargain hunters should pay a visit to nearby Oswaldtwistle Mills, housed in five former weaving sheds, which has over 80 discount outlets.

with rest platforms.



Explore Accrington town centre on the Accrington Acorn Trail, which takes you from the magnificent Town Hall, built in 1858 at the height of Accrington's textiles success, along Willow Street with its imposing houses and past Carnegie Library to the oldest part of town, along Warner Street.

On the last Sunday of the month, Vue host a sensory friendly screening designed to be an inclusive and welcoming environment for people with sensory sensitivities and their loved ones. Rose Grove







Rose Grove is a suburb of Burnley, west of the town centre. It is probably most well known for having one the last steam sheds on British Railways before the demise of steam in August 1968. The station is close to the Weavers Triangle on the Leeds Liverpool canal and to the Padiham Greenway.

The National Trust Property Gawthorpe Hall is accessible via the Greenway. Built in 1600, it was renovated in the 1850s by Sir Charles Barry who had previously designed the Houses of Parliament. Gawthorpe houses the North West's largest collection of portraits on loan from the National Portrait Gallery as well as The Gawthorpe Textiles Collection, a wonderful collection of intricate lace, embroidery and needlework put together by Rachel Kay-Shuttleworth, the last of her family to live in the hall.

Padiham Greenway

Unearth the stories of life in the past for both the rich and poor as you cycle along through Lancashire's landscape, discovering the place that once led the world in cotton production. Working mills, rich landowners' mansions, Victorian schoolrooms and beautiful parkland can all be found in the mill town of Burnley.

Start your journey at Queen Street Mill Textile Museum, the last surviving operational steam powered weaving mill in the world. Then go along the river and canal until you get to The Weavers' Triangle Visitor Centre and discover what it was like to live in a 19th century mill town.

Take a different route and start your journey at Towneley Hall where you can enjoy the beautiful parkland and visit the former home of the Towneley family. After exploring the house, meander throughthe grounds heading to The Weavers' Triangle.

Alternatively take the greenway from Padiham, which takes you on a gentle graded route through the town all the way to The Weavers' Triangle. Stop off on the way to admire the Elizabethan gem that is Gawthorpe Hall.

With interesting places to visit, a safe and enjoyable route and an abundance of cafés to refuel, you'll be sure to have a fun day out on your bikes on the Modern History Heritage Cycle Trail.





Burnley Manchester Road









Burnley is a thriving market town surrounded on all sides by breath-taking Pennine countryside. Whether you like hiking, cycling, windsurfing, kayaking, horse riding, golf or sailing, it's all available right here. Hire a rowing boat or kayak at Thompson Park, or windsurf and sail at Clowbridge Reservoir.

Unwind and enjoy Burnley's waterways - the canal, rivers and reservoirs are great places to escape to; walk by the river, take a boat trip along the canal or go windsurfing or sailing on the reservoirs.

Burnley Charter Walk Shopping Centre can be found on St James's Street and is a 12 minute walk from Burnley Manchester Road station, and has been recognised by The National Autistic Society for improvements made to the centre and staff training and awareness. The nationally recognised accreditation – known as "Autism Friendly" status – focuses on five key areas: customer information, staff/volunteer understanding, physical environment, customer experience and promoting understanding.

To achieve this high standard, the centre has made available some valuable resources including a new centre guide and autism cards. The guide is situated around the centre and available to download at home at www. charterwalk.com to help reduce the anxiety often associated with planning a visit to a new place.

The custom autism cards are available from centre management and the centre's website as a non-verbal way of communicating with staff members and fellow shoppers. For shoppers who struggle with sensory overload, a quiet hour takes place every Tuesday between 9-10am. Within this time, activities such as cleaning with machinery and maintenance are kept to a minimum and a number of retailers lower lights or cease playing music from stores.

Todmorden









There are many reasons to visit Todmorden - it has a long and spectacular history; it's high point being the Industrial Revolution. It is a bustling market town, with plenty of shopping opportunities, sitting on the Lancashire-Yorkshire border.

Todmorden sits firmly within West Yorkshire, since 1888, despite its Oldham postcode and the fact that most of its sporting teams play in Lancashire leagues! Todmorden is nestled at the convergence of three valleys, which provides the most jaw-dropping scenery for anyone with a mind for a walk.

Some of these beautiful walks follow canal routes, including a popular section of the Rochdale Canal from Todmorden to Hebden Bridge. It follows the flat towpath for just under 5 miles, so it's ideal for an easy family afternoon stroll. Along the way there are several pretty locks, old bridges, historic mills and nice views of the River Calder which runs alongside part of the canal.

The route starts in Todmorden and heads east along the towpath, passing Millwood, Lobb Mill, Eastwood, Charlestown and Calderside before coming into Hebden Bridge. Here you can catch a train or return along the towpath on foot if you prefer.

Walsden



Walsden is a large, thriving village in the civil parish of Todmorden in the Metropolitan Borough of Calderdale, West Yorkshire, England. Walsden has many quaint features, but especially the Cotton Weavers Café, which has an extensive menu as well as daily specials, a junior menu and a toddler menu. They also have a children's play area so parents and carers can relax and enjoy while the children are playing. They are a 13 minute walk from the train station and can be found on Rochdale Road.

Rochdale











Rochdale takes it's name from its position on the River Roch and is probably best known for its Co-op, the beginning of the co-operative movement, which today still includes the well known national supermarket chain. Rochdale is also well known for its textile industries including cotton. Its magnificent Town Hall built in 1871 takes pride of place in the centre of Rochdale, its original clock tower destroyed by fire in 1883 and rebuilt in 1887 is also home to a majestic stained glass window.

The town itself has many shops, with a daily market and boasts two shopping centres with many well known stores. There are also many specialised stores surrounding on Drake Street, Yorkshire Street, Cheetham Street and The Walk.

The Greater Manchester Fire Service Museum

The Museum tells the story of firefighting, particularly in the Greater Manchester region, and is directly across the road from the train station. The area has played a significant role in the story of fire brigades and fire engineering. It's a calm museum to visit during the day, with twenty-three larger exhibits, plus by many other items of firefighting equipment, uniforms, models, medals and insignia, paintings, curios and other objects.

The museum is open on Fridays (10am to 4pm) and on the first Sunday in the month (10am to 4pm). Entry is free. From about October they do get busy with primary school visits, so are not quiet between 10am and about 2pm on most Fridays.

They also run a quiet shopping event once a month on Sundays from 10am-12 (times are subject to change, call before attending), where groups of young people with autism and other needs have the shop exclusively open to themselves before opening times. Entry is £2 but this is discounted off any games purchased.





Cat Café Manchester Cat Café UK is on a mission to make people feel better. They believe that cats can help us physically, mentally and emotionally. Research has shown that hearing a cat purr can lower your blood pressure and stroking a cat can slow your heart rate. So by stopping, resting, and watching, it is Cat Café's aim to enable people to become more mindful and present in their day-to-day lives.

They have periods during the weekdays where they are quieter than usual. These tend to be in the evenings from 5pm to 7pm They recommend customers ringing to see which hours are quietest for that day.

Customers can either book online at www.catcafe.co.uk/book or they can come as a 'walk-in'. Booking online means customers pay £12 per person for an hour with all their drinks included. Walk-in customers pay £1 per person for every 5 minutes. They charge walk-ins on their way out of the cafe based on how long they have spent inside. Again all drinks are included in this.

Bookings are recommended at the weekends.

the Todmorden Curve

The Todmorden Curve is a multi-million pound investment; the first direct train service for over 40 years which now runs between East Lancashire and Manchester, from Blackburn, through Todmorden and into Manchester Victoria.

The reinstatement of 500 metres of track known as the Todmorden West Curve has improved journey times between Burnley, Accrington and Manchester. This has put Burnley and Accrington within commuting distance of Manchester and opened up job prospects, as well as tourist and leisure opportunities.
